CMM Curator Receives Master's Degree in Museum Studies

CMM curator, Dylan Hoffmann, recently received a Master of Arts in Museum Studies Degree from **Johns Hopkins University**. The two-year program, mostly administered on-line, focuses on the evolving role of museums in the 21st century with an emphasis on attracting new visitors, increasing engagement, and adapting museum experiences for today's



diverse audiences.

"I look forward to applying the skills I learned from esteemed JHU faculty and fellow graduate students, and I am grateful for CMM's financial and professional support," says Dylan. "The experience provided me the opportunity to meet museum professionals from all over the world and learn best practices."

The program involved a two-week seminar in New York attending local museums like South Street Seaport, Intrepid Museum, Brooklyn Navy Yard, MOMA and the MET. "Meeting staff from some of the world's top museums was a truly enlightening experience."

Dylan began his career in Geographic Information Systems until he switched gears by earning a MA in Education from National-Louis University, to become a middle school teacher, first in Nashville and then in Oak Park, Illinois. In 2016, just as CMM had moved to its new location in Bridgeport, Dylan began volunteering in the collections department. Recognizing his talent and skills, CMM hired Dylan as a full-time curator in 2018.

"Dylan's skills and expertise help to tell our maritime stories," says CMM vice chair Jerry Thomas. "He understands the relationship between history and artifacts – the stories we tell and objects that support those stories. With his additional knowledge from Johns Hopkins, he is truly a major asset to the museum."

If knowledge is the key to preparing for the unexpected, Dylan has armored himself with new skills and information. In addition to his Johns Hopkins Master's Degree, Dylan also received a Small Museum Pro Certificate in 2019 from the American Association of State and Local History.

Curator's Corner by Dylan Hoffmann

Howie LaBrant Canoe Won Awards at Century of Progress World's Fair



A 17-foot canoe, constructed of plywood by Howie LaBrant, is one of nearly onehundred small watercrafts residing in the **Ralph Frese Canoe Collection** at the Chicago Maritime Museum.

Howie LaBrant was born in Winnipeg, Canada and relocated to Rockford in the 1920s. He trained on the Rock and Pecatonica Rivers, where he raced canoes as a member of the Rockford Canoe Club. Howie met Bob Pomrencki, from the Columbia Canoe Club, and together, they took gold and silver hardware in all regattas and **American Canoe Association** (ACA) competitions in the early 1930s, including the nationals held at the Century of Progress Exposition in 1933.

An innovator and founding member of the ACA., Howie LaBrant developed a method of constructing sleek, v-bottom canoes out of waterproof plywood. He was motivated by the cheap cost of plywood in comparison to the more expensive wood and canvas canoes that existed on the market. At the time, a sheet of plywood cost a few dollars, while a wood and canvas canoe sold for \$75-\$85.

In 1941, Howie LaBrant and Bob Pomrencki teamed up for the 450-mile

Mississippi River race from Lake Itasca to Minneapolis-St. Paul. They used a high kneeling stance, in this homemade plywood canoe, and finished in first place. Throughout the ten-day race they out paddled professional guides and college athletes.

Howie Labrant was an inspiration to many within the paddling community, including Ralph Frese, a founding member of the Chicago Maritime Society. In 1980, the United States Canoe Association established "The LaBrant Award", which recognizes individuals for demonstrating outstanding contributions to the sport of canoeing. Ralph Frese acquired this prized canoe from Howie Labrant and donated it to the Chicago Maritime Museum, where both of their legacies will live on.
