CMM Completes the National Museum Assessment Program

The Chicago Maritime Museum received a follow-up review through the **Museum Assessment Program (MAP)**, which is administered by the **American Alliance of Museums** and funded by the **Institute of Museum and Library Service (IMLS)**.

This special opportunity, provided to only about 50 museums each year, allowed CMM to build upon the progress the museum has made since the original MAP assessment in 2018 by reuniting CMM with the original peer reviewer – Lindy Doshier, **Director of the US Naval Undersea Museum** and the **Puget Sound Navy Museum** for guidance and expertise on Collections Stewardship.

This assessment focuses on practical, ethical, and strategic collections issues and activities related to the care and management of a museum's collections per professional practices and standards. It also looks at the collections within the context of the museum's total operations, plans, and resource allocation. The results will help the museum—governing authority and staff—increase its knowledge, recognize and mitigate risk, take action, prioritize long-term collections stewardship issues, gain physical and intellectual control of the collections, and write policies and plans.

Museums selected for follow-up review must demonstrate they have made strides in acting on and implementing the recommendations outlined by their peer reviewer during the original assessment. The Chicago Maritime Museum participated in the Follow Up MAP Site Visit that involved review of significant progress made, including the completion and implementation of two core documents for AMM Accreditation – the **Collections Management Policy** and **Emergency Response Plan**.

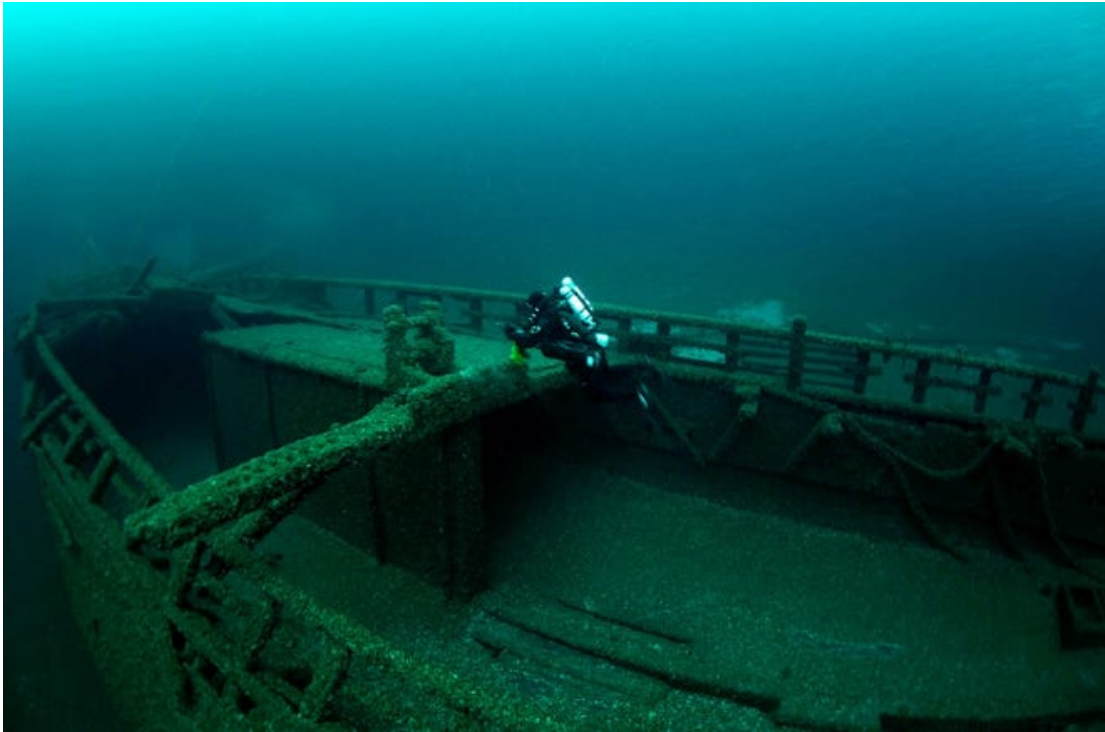
Key areas of progress made since the original visit include the development of the Collections Management Policy and structural improvements that provide best practice preventive conservation care. Future opportunities involve the continuation of collections inventorying, cataloging, database entry, policy and plan development, and continued storage improvement projects.

Since its creation in 1981, the MAP program has served more than 5000 museums to strengthen operations, plan for the future, and meet standards through self-assessment and a consultative site visit from an expert peer reviewer. AAM is the only organization representing the nation's entire museum community and has been dedicated to promoting excellence within the museum field for more than 100 years.
